Vision and Difference encourages readers to interpret visual images in relation to the social, cultural, and political context in which they were produced. It highlights the importance of interpretation, making it clear that interpreting an artwork is a political process that will be affected by our past experiences, value systems, and prejudices. This text illustrates how the reader might clarify the meaning of an artwork using a feminist approach. This style of interpretation considers the lives and experiences of women, and the ways that visual images contribute to the construction of gender.

Griselda Pollock's *Vision and Difference* does not provide an exhaustive study of art history; rather it gives readers the analytical tools to create new connections and readings. Pollock does not restrict her methods to one historical period or artistic medium, instead she gives examples across a broad range of sources, demonstrating how her ideas might be applied to any number of artworks. From Impressionist landscapes to Pre-Raphaelite portraits, photography, advertising, and sculpture, Pollock charts the formation of modern attitudes toward women. Not only does she provide feminist re-readings of works by male artists, such as Degas and Dante Gabriel Rossetti, but she also considers the work of their long-forgotten female contemporaries, such as Mary Cassatt and Berthe Morisot. Both art historians and artists can adopt her theories, and easily create new approaches to the production and analysis of artworks.

In 1967, she went to Oxford University to study Modern History, graduating in 1970. She then attended the Courtauld Institute, University of London, where she completed her MA and PhD.
