Preface

A Chronicle of First Broadcast Musical Performances in the United Kingdom, 1923–1996 provides detailed information taken from the P-as-B (Programme-as-Broadcast) daily programme log, held at the BBC Written Archives Centre, in Caversham, Berkshire. The most recent available information goes up to 1996. Arranged in chronological order, entries are given for broadcasts of first performances of musical works in the United Kingdom, and include the following details: the date of the broadcast, the composer, the title of the work, performers and conductor. Notable examples include the first UK performance from the Savoy Hotel of George Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue on 15 June 1925, the first broadcast performance of Ralph Vaughan Williams's Benedicite from the Queen's Hall on 28 July 1931, and Sir Arthur Bliss's television opera Tobias and the Angel on 19 May 1960. The most famous example was the first broadcast of Benjamin Britten's music for Night Mail, the film which was first transmitted on BBC Television on 16 October 1949. Entries are confined to first performances broadcast by the BBC; performances from local and commercial broadcasting stations are excluded. Where possible authors' and translators' names are shown for vocal and choral works, though in certain cases such names are not available, despite extensive research.

The BBC began broadcasting in November 1922, and only two first performances are shown as having been broadcast in 1923.

Early broadcasts were experimental: transmissions were relayed to 'prepared' audiences such as those who assembled at the Folkestone Hospital, and the Deal and Walmer Cottage Hospital fêtes in August 1922. By December 1924 sound technicians were able to relay a performance of Handel's Messiah, in which the soloists were Dorothy Silk, soprano, Astra Desmond, contralto, John Coates, tenor, and R.F. Palmer, bass, with a choir from Sheffield, and the Wireless Orchestra conducted by Henry Coward. The Wireless Orchestra gave the first

broadcast documented performance of Arthur Wood's orchestral suite My Native Heath conducted by Dan Godfrey, jnr, on 30 January 1925.²

The style of music programming was also experimental. As early as 27 June 1923 one of the earliest examples of one-composer programmes featured the then relatively unfamiliar music of Camille Saint-Saëns. A programme devoted to the music of Sir Alexander Mackenzie was featured on 15 October 1923. Mackenzie was then principal of the Royal Academy of Music (1888–1924), and conductor of the Philharmonic Society (1892–1899).

From 1944 the BBC took over responsibility for the Henry Wood Promenade Concerts³ and thereby reinforced its position as the nation's leading promoter of new music. One of the outstanding broadcasts by the BBC took place in Manchester on 2 December 1928 in which Lev Pouishnov, the Ukrainian pianist, gave the first performance in Great Britain of Rakhmaninov's Piano Concerto No. 4 in G, Op. 40, conducted by Sir Henry Wood.

Many new broadcast works were of performances from overseas. History was made at Bedford on 17 November 1944 when the first ever European performance was given of a work written by a Basutoland-born composer, Michael Mosoen Moerane. The work was his symphonic poem My Country, and the performance was given by the BBC Symphony Orchestra conducted by Clarence Raybould. Moerane's work was brought to the attention of Dr Hartman, head of Rhodes University College, Grahamstown in 1944 who was quoted by a London Evening Standard Reporter, on 15 November, that the work was that of '... a self taught native. It is phenomenal.'

One of the most important events in the history of BBC music was when the Daily Telegraph announced, 2 December 1982, that the Manchester based BBC Northern Symphony Orchestra was to increase the string section by ten members, and as an acknowledgement to the orchestra's national standing, renamed it as the BBC Philharmonic. It plays an important part in the performance of new music, and in their 50th anniversary season, in 1984, it gave no less than six first performances. The principal conductor is Yan Pascal Tortelier, and in the last six decades the orchestra, under its various previous names, has been conducted by Sir Charles Groves, Sir Edward Downes and Sir Peter Maxwell Davies to name but three of a long line of many distinguished conductors.

Incidental music was, and still is, an important aspect of the BBC's output,

and first broadcast performances of incidental music are included in this Chronicle. The late 1930s through to the 1950s saw the development of the genre by composers such as Antony Hopkins, Elizabeth Maconchy, Elizabeth Poston, Alan Rawsthorne and Mátyás Seiber. Benjamin Britten composed the incidental music for a series of six programmes entitled An American in England which were broadcast in the summer of 1942. For this series the Orchestra of the RAF was conducted by Wing Commander Rudolf P.O'Donnell⁵ (see plate 8). Britten also provided the music for a drama set in an internment camp in France called Appointment, broadcast on 20 July 1942 and again performed by O'Donnell's RAF orchestra.

The BBC continues to lie at the forefront of British musical heritage and the promotion of new music at home and abroad. The major event in the history of British music in the twentieth century, despite the fact that this lies outside the scope of this volume, took place on 15 February 1998 in the Royal Festival Hall: this was the first concert hall performance of Anthony Payne's completion of Elgar's Symphony No. 3 given by the BBC Symphony Orchestra conducted by Andrew (now Sir Andrew) Davis. The best way to show how the BBC has highlighted such significant of all musical events is through its broadcasts. This book therefore becomes a chronicle of important musical performances over the major part of the twentieth century.

If I have inadvertently omitted any first performances I shall be glad to hear from any performers who were concerned. To them I apologize, and trust that such omissions can be rectified in future editions.

Methodology

1. All entries can be assumed to be world premières, unless they include one of the following abbreviations:

FBP = 'first broadcast performance' as opposed to a première

FCP = 'first concert hall performance'

FCPL = 'first concert hall performance in London'

FECP = 'first concert hall performance in England'

FEP = 'first European performance'

FLP = 'first London performance'

FMP = 'first performance in modern times'

UKFBP = 'first broadcast performance in the UK'

UKFCP = 'first concert hall performance in the UK'

UKFP = 'first performance in the UK'

There was often a lengthy gap between the first performance of a work, and the first broadcast performance. For example, Elgar's *The Dream of Gerontius* was first performed on 3 October 1900 in Birmingham, though the first broadcast performance was not given until 20 April 1924.

- All dates given are the actual dates of transmission rather than dates of recording. UKFBPs embraces pre-recorded tapes from abroad, together with concert hall and studio performances of works originating from other countries.
- 3. Unless otherwise indicated, performances were broadcast from BBC studios (or stations as they were originally called) in London. Live and recorded performances transmitted from a concert hall are shown as having come from the outside broadcast venue, i.e. from Queen's Hall, or, since 1951, from the Royal Festival Hall.

During the Second World War the BBC Symphony Orchestra was evacuated to Bristol and Bedford. Performances from these two stations are appropriately designated.

4. All entries are for complete works only. It is beyond the scope of this volume to include separate movements from suites, concertos and symphonies, and performances transmitted by commercial radio and television.

- 5. Incidental music heard for the first time in radio drama and documentaries was an essential part of musical 'life' in the BBC. This was usually performed by an hoc ensemble of instrumentalists and/or singers conducted by the composer. Only exceptions to this rule are indicated.
- 6. Unless otherwise indicated, all orchestral concerts were given by the BBC Symphony Orchestra. For performances given by the BBC SO only the name of the conductor is given.
